Building better homes

Work is well underway on our scheme to build 150 new council homes at Neasham Road. Here we put the spotlight on two of the team involved in the project.

Construction manager Richard Dodgson, 45, has worked in the industry on and off for 27 years. "I joined the council in 2020, becoming a site manager in 2021 and moving to my current role last October. The council offered me the opportunity to advance my career, providing invaluable training and support. There's a very supportive culture within the organisation at all levels of management and I'd certainly recommend it to others.

"Being a part of the team improving the town's housing stock and providing affordable homes to those who need it feels very rewarding. I'm very proud of the standard and quality of the homes we're creating, they're spacious and have a standard of finish which can rival any of the private housing developments.

"The attention to detail, finish and quality is incredible and generally they're up to 20% larger than market competitors.

"They're not only great quality, but also provide great communities for our tenants to feel safe living in."

Apprentice joiner Rob Galt, 22, joined the team in 2020 and is now in the third and final year of his apprenticeship. "It's been great, and one of the best things has been the variety of work — I've been involved in the new bowling alley at the Dolphin Centre and the

pool revamp, the library refurbishment and now these new homes.

"I'd definitely recommend it. It's a good team and the camaraderie is great.

"Working on the new homes has been really good. It's great to see the whole process, seeing them come together from start to finish. I've been involved at every stage from the roof supports; doors, skirting and architraves to fitting the kitchens.

"I'm sure those who come to live here will love it — they're lovely, warm homes built to a good standard in a great location."

The Neasham Road site is part-funded with £7.35m from Homes England and follows the success of the council's new build schemes at Lingfield. It includes a mixture of rent and rent-to-buy properties offering a first step to affordable home ownership, with 64 two-bed apartments, 24 two-bed houses, 43 three-bed houses and 19 four-bed houses.

The first properties will be available this summer and the project is due to be completed by the end of 2025.

Matthew Roche, cabinet member for health and housing, said: "Providing more affordable homes is a key priority for the council. I'd like to thank Richard, Rob and all of our amazing in-house team for building such quality houses, which will offer decent homes for local people for generations to come."

TEES VALLEY



Darlington will welcome the UK's best cyclists in June as the British National Road Championships will come to Tees Valley.

The town centre will be the location for this year's circuit races, with riders taking on a tricky technical route on Friday 21 June.

The race is part of a new partnership between British Cycling and Tees Valley Combined Authority which aims to grow cycling and tourism links in the region. The circuit races will take place on the evening of Friday 21 June in Darlington town centre, which successfully hosted the start of two stages of the Tour of Britain in 2008 and 2009. Megan Barker and Ollie Wood will be hoping to retain their national circuit race titles after famous victories in last year's event in Redcar.

Tees Valley Mayor Ben Houchen said: "This fantastic partnership will further bolster our area's growing reputation as a superb cycling destination, and we look forward to again welcoming the nation's best riders as they take on these attractive but also highly demanding routes.

"We are continuing to grow our visitor economy and this deal will deliver millions of pounds in spending which will provide a boost for our great restaurants, coffee shops, hotels and bike shops.

"Events such as this not only showcase the best of what our area has to offer, but also are a great way to encourage people of all ages to get on their bikes in Darlington."

This year's event follows a successful first national championships in Tees Valley in 2023. This year's road races will be held in Redcar and Cleveland on Sunday 23 June, with riders starting and finishing in Saltburn.



A 50 year love of dahlias and chrysanthemums has scooped Geoff Gardener national and international awards.

Geoff's love of the flowers was sparked by watching his dad grow them in the garden and blossomed when he saw an advert for the Darlington Chrysanthemum and Dahlia Show in 1972 and went along to take a look.

"I have been a member of The National Dahlia Society (NDS) and the Darlington Chrysanthemum and Dahlia Society (DCDS) for 50 years.

"Based in the UK, The NDS is the biggest dahlia society in the world, and I have been chairman of the northern committee that looks after members from the midlands to the Scottish borders, for 17 years. At our annual general meeting last March, I was awarded the NDS gold medal for services to the dahlia, one of only five ever to be awarded to

northern members since the society was founded in 1881.

"Earlier this year the DCDS, of which I am chairman, awarded me the National Chrysanthemum Society silver medal for long service to the society.

Following this I was proud to be awarded the American Dahlia Society (ADS) silver medal, the first to be awarded to a member of the northern committee since the ADS was founded in 1915."

Take steps to cleaner air

Get involved in Clean Air Day on Thursday 20 June.

Did you know air pollution causes up to 36,000 deaths in the UK every year? Poor air quality can aggravate existing lung conditions such as asthma and heart disease, especially in younger and older people.

Air pollution is all around us; in the environment from traffic, industry and farming, and our homes from the fuel we use to cleaning products we buy.

There are lots of ways to get involved in Clean Air Day. One very simple way is to leave the car at home for the day and get walking or cycling more.

Becoming more active can also improve your health and reduce the risk of heart disease, stroke, cancer, diabetes and mental ill health.

If you need help to get started, check out the Active Travel sessions – every Tuesday, 1-3pm, in Darlington Library or contact our travel advisors who can also advise on local bus and train travel. Email traveladvisors@darlington.gov.uk or call 07966 883805.

Walking and cycling more or taking the bus, also helps to tackle climate change by reducing the amount of fossil fuels burned and released into the air

Looking into potholes

We're responsible for the maintenance of more than 574km (366 miles) of roads - this includes identifying and repairing potholes. We are not responsible for potholes on the A66 and A1, private roads or shop car parks.



We inspect urban roads for potholes every three months and rural and town centre roads every 30 days, determining how urgently each pothole needs repairing.

If a pothole on a road is less than 40mm (1.6in) or less than 20mm (0.8in) on a footpath we won't repair it but we will keep inspecting it to make sure it doesn't get worse.



We do not repair potholes on a street-bystreet basis; we repair them according to the level of urgency. This means we may come and repair the biggest and most urgent potholes on a street and come back at a later date to repair less urgent ones.

Although we do all we can to keep the roads and pathways safe, we need you to help by reporting potholes via our online report system www.darlington. gov.uk/reportit or call 405222. When you report a pothole, we will send someone out within 24 hours to determine how urgently it needs repairing.

Once inspected, if it meets the criteria, the pothole will be either repaired within 20 days or five weeks. The most dangerous potholes will be repaired within 24 hours. Our pothole filling team is out all day throughout the year.

commitment to excellence drives us to continually strive for the highest standards of care.

We will continue to listen to feedback from patients, families, and staff to identify areas where we can make further improvements. Our aim is to ensure that every family feels supported, empowered, and safe throughout their maternity journey.

We value the voices of expectant mothers, pregnant people and their families, and we are dedicated to actively involving them in decision-making processes.

The Trust remains rated as good overall.

We are constantly improving our facilities to ensure patients receive not only the very best care, but also the best experience.

It's also important to us that our talented and hardworking staff have the very best working environment. A number of major improvement projects are underway or have recently been completed.

These include an expanded and updated endoscopy suite at Bishop Auckland Hospital, the demolition of much older, unused buildings at University Hospital of North Durham, to make way for new buildings in the future, and a significant expansion of our outpatient facilities at Darlington Memorial Hospital.

We will continue to invest in our facilities to ensure they are of the highest quality.



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Work starts on sustainable development in Darlington

Ground has been broken on a project to deliver three new industrial facilities in Darlington.

The Greenbox development, just off the A66, is a joint venture between Partners Group, a leading global private markets firm, and Citivale, a specialist logistics developer and operator. The development will provide over 400,000 square feet of warehouse and office space with market-leading environmental credentials.

Work on the 24-acre site is expected to take 36 weeks and will be delivered by Winvic, a national contractor specialising in delivering sustainable buildings. The development will use net zero construction practices and all units will be rooftop solar panel ready and will have access to parking for electric vehicles helping to reduce future impact on the environment and supporting the council's net zero ambitions.



The facilities are expected to be available for occupation at the start of next year, creating business and job opportunities for the town.

Bossing it for female leaders

A new study has identified Darlington as the thirdbest place in England to be a female entrepreneur.

Research from iwoca, one of Europe's largest small business lenders, ranked areas using Office of National Statistics data including the level of female representation among the self-employed workforce, childcare costs, gender pay gaps, and small business growth.

We also have access to a fantastic pool of talent thanks to the excellent education facilities available locally and the high number of people educated to degree level or above in the area.

Supporting our carers!

A new commitment has been made in Darlington to recognise and support those with caring responsibilities.

Around 10,000 people in Darlington identify as a carer, with potentially many more yet to come forward.

Some people take on caring responsibilities on a daily basis, but have not recognised themselves as a carer – seeing themselves primarily as a loved one.

Darlington's Commitment to Carers was developed by the carers' strategy steering group — which includes the council, Darlington Carers Support and other partners — and aims to make sure that people have the information they need to recognise themselves as carers so they can access the advice and support they need to carry out their role.



Carers Week, an annual national campaign to raise awareness of caring and highlight the challenges unpaid carers face, runs from 10-16 June.

SWAP TO STOP

The Darlington Stop Smoking Service is working with local vape suppliers to give people who want to stop smoking, access to free electronic cigarettes and e-liquids, containing nicotine, for up to 12 weeks.

Smoking is the leading cause of preventable illness in the UK, and kicking the habit for good can be extremely challenging. The Swap to Stop scheme aims to reduce the harms caused from smoking

cigarettes by supporting tobacco users to transition to vaping which is less harmful overall.

Participants in the scheme will also have tailored support through Darlington's Stop Smoking Hub based at the Dolphin Centre.

Foster caring is so rewarding

Being a foster carer is rewarding in so many ways. Seeing a baby take their first steps, watching a child play with other children for the first time, hearing them say I love you, seeing a teenager pass their exams, driving test or secure a college place – the magical moments are endless.

The council has recently improved its financial offer to foster carers.

Foster carers are self-employed and receive weekly payments, per child. These are made of an age-related allowance, which is set by the government to cover costs associated with looking after the child (we pay above the amount set by the government), and a professional carer's fee – a figure determined by carer experience, the number of children in care, their ages and the complexity of their support needs.

Foster carers also receive an annual contribution to council tax, 14 days paid respite, refer friend bonuses, and five-year appreciation payments, subject to criteria being met. A holiday payment, made up of two weeks age related allowance, is paid to carers with children in placement during the summer holidays and at Christmas, to contribute to the additional costs associated with those times of year.

Foster carers are supported with training and regular support groups including Mockingbird, a network bringing fostering families together to find support and encouragement in shared experiences.

We need to recruit people who can offer love and support. The recent increase in our carers allowances and payments, which are now in line with independent foster care agencies, will help us to attract the best possible candidates.

If you have considered becoming a foster carer, please take the time to find out more. Babies, children, and young people near you need supportive caring homes. You don't need to own your home, or be unemployed; we support working carers and carers who have their own children. We just need you, with your drive to make a difference. Joining us ensures local children live and grow up where they know and want to be.

Example payments

An approved foster carer, caring for two siblings (aged three and four) who have been in placement for 25 weeks between November and March, with no respite care taken would be paid:

Age-related allowance - £9,000

Approved carer fee - £6,875

Council tax contribution - £1.500

Payment instead of respite - £507.98

Festival payment - £676.16

Total £18,559.14

There would be no tax to pay on this figure. Fostering households are exempt from paying tax on the first £18,140 per annum earned from fostering and carers qualify for tax relief after this threshold.

Newly approved carers who have looked after a baby for twelve weeks between April and June would be paid:

Age-related allowance - £2,100

Approved carer fee - £2,100

Payment instead of respite - £174.90

Total £4,374.90

No tax would need to be paid on these earnings.

Peer mentors are proud to support foster children

Our foster carers do an amazing job welcoming children and young people into their homes in their times of need.

Young people who have lived with a foster carer or family have a wealth of experience from their time in care and can provide support and guidance to other children and young people in care.

The council has appointed 13 peer mentors, who are training for their new role to support foster carers, children, and young people in care. A peer mentor will be matched with a young person in care who has requested support. They will provide a caring and responsive mentoring and befriending service, working with their young person to ensure their social and emotional needs are met. They will also support them to improve their wellbeing and give them access to positive activities and opportunities.

Faye Marsh, the council's participation officer who is managing the peer mentoring project, said:

"Peer mentors have lived in care and are in a great position to offer children in care support and understanding and ultimately be someone they can turn to and trust, without being judged.

"They offer guidance and hope to become positive role models and long-lasting key figures for young people who require their support."

Kristan, 27 who has lived in care most of her life, is proud to become a peer mentor. She said: "I think this is a fantastic opportunity for children and young people in Darlington. When I was young, I often rebelled against staff as I thought they didn't understand what I was going through.

"Having a peer mentor has many benefits to the people being mentored and is so rewarding for me as a mentor. Being able to help someone is such a great feeling – I feel like I'm giving back something for all the help and support I received when I was in foster care."

Protect the environment and children's health, switch off your engine when parked.

Ambitious plans for community music venue



The Forum Music Studios has been awarded capital investment of £404,000 from Arts Council England to extend, renew and repair its music facility in Borough Road.

Founder, director and chief executive Allison McKay said: "This is an exciting phase of growth for our much-loved music and arts venue. We are proud of what we have achieved to date.

"It's our mission to ensure music - whether through entertainment, education or improving people's lives through music-related activities – doesn't just exist in Darlington, but is widely recognised as a first-class experience that benefits everyone."

The investment awarded by Arts Council England and member shareholder offer will fund the development of:

- a new standalone, high-spec recording studio with sensory and high-quality digital production
- new green room facilities for touring artists
- · an accessible audience viewing mezzanine
- high-tech installations including solar panels to help reduce the carbon footprint
- a new welcoming entrance and reception plus an ecofriendly roof garden
- a fully equipped and extended kitchen to give an opportunity to a local food social entrepreneur to operate a daily food service.

There are also plans to make significant improvements to the internal visitor facilities and external aspect of the building which will complement the proposed Treasury to Darlington Economic Campus building next door to the venue.

The Forum has been operated as a not-for-profit social enterprise since 2011 and it recently converted to a community benefit society to recruit members with shared ownership.



Parking on pavements and verges

We often receive reports of people parking on grass verges and pavements. It is a persistent problem and can have a big impact on those with sight and mobility difficulties and for families with pushchairs. It can also cause a hazard for other motorists if cars are parked on a bend or corner.

Grass verges and pavements are not designed to take the weight of cars and they are often damaged by vehicles being parked on them. This damage can be costly to repair.



THE RULES

The public has the legal right to use the whole width of the road and pavement (including grass verges) and motorists have no legal right to park on them.

If there are yellow lines on the road you can't avoid them by parking on the pavement or a grass verge and you may be fined even if your vehicle is not on the lines.

If there are no yellow lines, it is not illegal to park on a grass verge or pavement but you may be prosecuted if your vehicle persistently damages the area. It is illegal for goods vehicles to park on grass verges, and they can be issued with a penalty notice.

Please park responsibly and consider everyone who needs to use the road and pavement.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

We know how frustrating it can be if you see people continually parking on pavements or verges, but please do not take matters into your own hands. It is against the law to put obstructions like blocks, rocks or posts on grass verges and pavements without permission.

If you attempt to block a verge or pavement we will ask you to remove the obstruction or we may remove it ourselves, at your expense. If you block a pavement or grass verge you are also responsible for any accidents or incidents caused by the obstruction, including injury or damage to people, vehicles or property.










HOW TO GET TO HOPETOWN DARLINGTON

Driving and Parking


